Our Educational Department will offer courses available to squadron members based on demand. To offer a class we will need a minimum of three students.

The five Advanced Grade courses available are:

- ⇒ Boat Handling: An extension of America's Boating Course, this course continues the topics presented in ABC with greater detail. This course replaces the former Seamanship course.
- ⇒ Piloting: This course emphasizes planning and checking along with the use of GPS for determining position, and introduces digital charting along with traditional charting, compass and dead reckoning skills.
- ⇒ Advanced Marine Navigation: AMN continues Piloting with advanced plotting techniques, and an introduction to determining tides and currents.
- ⇒ Junior Navigation: This course introduces the student to navigating in an offshore environment. This includes using an electronic course plotter, and the use of a sextant to determine position while offshore. The student will also take sights of the sun with a marine sextant.
- ⇒ Navigation: This is a continuation of Junior Navigation that includes using electronic navigation tools to plot courses offshore. Sextant use will be expanded to include sights on a planet, star, the moon, and the sun. Also in this course is the study of electronic offshore navigation planning and execution using downloadable computer software.

At the top, Point of View Park offers a scenic overlook, fountain, and walking trails.

Even experienced boaters can use a refresher on some topics. Here are a few that caught my eye.

A 6 min video on "Marine Radio Etiquette" demonstrates the various uses of different VHF channels on marine radios. Viewers learn about the three types of calls appropriate for emergency Channel 16. Also featured are tips for speaking using protocols for proper radio communications.

A 5 min video on "Navigating Locks" which covers preparations boaters should make prior to passing through locks. Viewers learn steps to take upon arriving at and entering a lock. Also featured are tips for securing vessels as water levels change in locks, the role lockmasters play, and how to safely exit from locks.



July 9th at 7:30 am three boats left for Manitowoc from North Point Marina-Dave/Sue Anthony (Relax Inn), Ray/Deb Adam (Reel Paradise) and Dan/Chris Luczak (Seventh Lady). We left a day early to miss the weather and waves that were expected on July 10th.

July 9th was a sunny and calm day—perfect for a 111-mile trip. We arrived at the harbor around noon. Manitowoc is a stop for the Badger and home to the Cobia WWII submarine and museum. The marina has a boater's lounge that we used to play games, we dined at Ryan's on




We also had a bocce ball tournament on the grass outside the boater's lounge after we enjoyed a "bring whatever you have onboard" meal.



IDNR Cruise on the Chain by Chuck Burger

On July 27th my friend, Alan Travis and I, took his boat and picked up Hunter Nikolai at Watt's marina on the Chain O' Lakes for an afternoon of boating. Hunter is the new Volunteer Services Coordinator for the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) in Region 2, which encompasses our area. He is located at the James "Pate" Philip state park in Bartlett. Hunter is new to the IDNR and had never been on the Chain before.

We started out cruising Pistakee Lake which was relatively quiet. We then proceeded to the west channel that goes under Rt.12 and

into Nippersink Lake. That channel, like all the channels on the Chain, is no wake. As usual there were a lot of boats going up and down the channel.

Our trip then took us through Nippersink and into Grass Lake. Of course, the main feature of Grass Lake is Blarney's Island. We drove by it but did not stop to go in. Traffic was getting heavier.

The next channel took us to Lake Marie. From there we went through a short channel to Bluff Lake. Bluff is a smaller lake with a lot of boat traffic.

The next channel took us from Bluff Lake to Spring Lake and into Petite Lake. This is a long channel with homes on both sides of the channel. The homes used to be summer cottages, but over the last number of years most of them have been converted to full-time residences. Again, lots of traffic on this channel.



The next lake was Petite Lake. This is the smallest lake on the Chain but one of the most crowded. There is a huge sandbar at the southeast end of the lake, which always has a great number of boats rafted up and this day was no exception.

The next channel took us to Fox Lake, the second largest lake on the Chain and the most popular. The two pictures were taken at Columbia Bay, at the northern end of the lake. Again, being a beautiful day, there were a huge number of boats rafted up there.



We then went down Fox Lake and proceeded back to Pistakee and back to Watt's marina. The marina was so crowded that we could not get to the launch ramp to drop Hunter off. We went to Alan's summer home, put the boat on the lift, and I drove Hunter back to the marina to get his truck.

The whole trip took us about three hours, and it gave Hunter a good exposure to see what boating on the Chain O'Lakes was all about.
